GATEWAY UPDATE

The United States Army Corps of Engineers (“USACE”) excavation project, which moved 1,625,173 cubic yards of dirt, set grades for future fields, trails and other recreation amenities is now complete. The stretch of trails north of the Trinity River and just west of Beach Street that was previously closed is now open to the public and once again provides a beautiful connection to the over 72 miles of Trinity Trails.

Later this year, the United States Army Corps of Engineers (“USACE”) will begin Phase 2 excavation work in the park. The excavation work in Gateway provides needed flood protection for our city and gets these areas of the park ready for recreational amenities.

The excavation work is expected to take place this fall. At this time this will be an 8a Sole Source contract, however, listed below are sub-contracting opportunities.

WHITE SETTLEMENT BRIDGE CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

The bridge contractor is currently erecting bridge superstructure falsework on the White Settlement bridge so that the box girders and concrete deck can be constructed. The bridge contractor is currently working on the east and west portions of the bridge simultaneously. Once the falsework is

completed, the Contractor will begin forming the bridge box girders.

Work continues on the North Main St. and Henderson Street Bridges. Both are expected to complete in Spring of 2020.

“Fortify responds to a very sobering reality,” said Chamber President and CEO Bill Thornton. “We – the Chamber, Fort Worth and the region – are at a crossroads in economic development.

“We can risk gambling on business as usual to try to keep up with unprecedented growth challenges and risk missing opportunities. Or we can field new strengths for greater reach and achievement, which are Fortify’s goals.” *(Continued on back)*

The Chamber has launched Fortify's four pillars: Business Recruitment & Retention; Talent Development, Attraction and Retention; Small Business & Entrepreneur Support; and Government Advocacy.

Meanwhile, Gengelbach said, the Chamber has launched fundraising initiatives, moving its fiscal year to January 1 "to accommodate the needs of our investors and leverage the necessary investment as soon as possible to keep our momentum. We are building the ship as we sail."

Fortify's budget goal this year is \$6.5 million to fund external marketing of Fort Worth, business advocacy at all government levels and local entrepreneur support, Gengelbach said, with plans to scale up the budget to \$8.1 million in the next two years.

Fortify's four pillars contain measurable goals. Top goals include:

- ◆ Business Attraction and Existing Business Retention and Expansion
- ◆ Attract four Fortune 1000 corporate headquarters.
- ◆ Attract 2,000 new jobs and create 2,000 jobs with wages > the county average.
- ◆ Attract 20 Inc. 5000 companies.

Talent Development, Retention and Attraction

- ◆ 5% increase in the percentage of population age 25+ with postsecondary degrees, licenses or certifications.
- ◆ 10% increase in targeted industries talent supply.

Advocacy

- ◆ Collaborate w/stakeholders to secure funding for Trinity Metro master plan
- ◆ Improve business sector diversity on advocacy committees
- ◆ Promote Fort Worth as a center for political issue discussions

Small Business and Entrepreneur Support

- ◆ Increase business start-ups by 10%.
- ◆ Achieve Top 20 status in national entrepreneur rankings in at least one category.

Annual Goals:

- ◆ Develop and promote free entrepreneur and small business support services
- ◆ Understand feasibility of a 'Start-Up Fort Worth' Foundation
- ◆ Develop incubators and innovation labs around targeted/emerging industries (via collaboration w/ stakeholders)

Strategies:

- ◆ Establish advisory guild to provide basic counsel and guidance for small business owners/operators

- ◆ Assess existing small business ecosystem and provide guidance and infrastructure for continued development & expansion
- ◆ Develop and execute a comprehensive outreach initiative to maximize residents' access to chamber services and resources
